MEETING TOPIC: Creating A Rhododendron Garden & Enhancing It With Companion Plantings

SPEAKER: Bee Brown of our DeAnza Chapter

Bee & her husband Paul got involved in the Rhododendron Society over 20 years ago when they bought a home in the redwoods on Skyline Drive. The property was virtually derelict and completely devoid of any landscaping. But the terrain, according to Bee, was clearly rhododendron country – “deep in the redwoods, often foggy, with areas of deep redwood duff”. Later Bee and Paul moved down the hill to Portola Valley. Here her passion for rhododendrons and gardening continues and is clearly seen in the spectacular garden we get to visit periodically for chapter functions. Her talk will be about how they landscaped their properties, with a focus on companion plants which include shrubs, perennials and ground covers.

SHOW & TELL

In keeping with Bee's talk about companion plants, please bring your favorite rhododendron companion plant to share. Broadening our knowledge and getting new ideas for more beautiful and creative gardens is always a good thing.

MAINTENANCE

After the blooms start to fade, don't neglect to snap off the spent blooms. You'll want your plant's energy going into producing new green growth and hopefully flowers for next year, but not seed production. Consider tip pruning single shoots for a bushier plant. Although we have had a wet winter, don't be lulled into thinking that you don't have to water. A couple of days of 70+ degrees, plus dry and windy weather will dry out the soil, wilting blooms and tender new growth. Don Wallace of Singing Tree Nursery feeds his rhodies on Father's Day; because we're further south, you might think about feeding your plants over the Memorial Day week-end.
