MAINTENANCE

Don't be lulled by shorter days & cooler nights, the days are still hot, so keep your plants well watered & mulched. Advice from Don Wallace: "Around this time of year, (late summer or early fall), you may notice the symptoms of Powdery Mildew that affects rhododendrons. At first you may notice one of your rhododendrons is dropping much of its foliage, making it look leggy and bare. Upon closer inspection, you will notice the leaves have a 'mottled' appearance...faint yellowish blotches on the tops of the leaves. When viewing the undersides of the leaves, you will see faint purplish-gray splotches. This is the classic look of this disease. It will not kill your plant, but will cause much of the foliage to drop. The cause varies from poor air circulation to humid, shady conditions, to rhododendron cultivars that have no resistance to the disease (the most common cause). Powdery mildew is more severe on shaded plants and is favored by the high humidity found in crowded plantings and damp locations. The disease literally eats the leaf tissue, and when it gets to the petiole, where the leaf attaches to the stem, the connection fails & the leaf drops.

Non-Chemical Management

Rake and destroy fallen leaves year-round to reduce infection source. Do not compost diseased materials. Do not overwater or over-fertilize plants, as the fungus favors succulent new growth. Space plantings to allow good air circulation. Do not plant in extremely shaded or damp areas. Plant resistant species or cultivars. "(Ask Don for names)

Chemical Management

Multiple applications may be necessary to really clean up your plants. We don't recommend very hard chemicals, but do feel the either copper or sulfur work well. We recommend those that are liquid that you can easily mix and put into a sprayer. There is a biological fungicide called Actinovate, This one is categorized as Organic. Most plant nurseries carry it."
